Hello everyone!

This week, amongst the saints that the church celebrates this week, we will celebrate the memory of St Anthony of Padua on Friday 13th.

Saint Anthony was born in Lisbon in 1195 & died on the 13th of June 1231 in Arcella, Verona in Italy. As many of us know, he is invoked for the return of lost property & he is also the patron saint of sailors, fishermen, the poor, & surprisingly to many, in Mexico he is the saint invoked to find one's spouse.

Saint Anthony's name was originally Fernando Martins de Bulhoes, he was born into a wealthy family in Lisbon & was raised in the church. His wealthy & noble family arranged for him to be instructed at the local cathedral school. At the age of 15, he was received into the Canons Regular of the Order of the Holy Cross at the Abbey of Saint Vincent on the outskirts of Lisbon

He joined the Augustinian canons in 1210 & probably became a priest. In 1220 he joined the Franciscan order, taking the new name of Anthony (in honour of St Anthony of the Desert) & hoping to preach to the Saracens & become a martyr. On his way to Morocco, he became seriously ill & was forced to return home. However, his ship back to Portugal was blown off course & eventually landed in Sicily. Because of his continuing poor health, he was not allowed to pursue his missionary work. Instead, he taught theology at Bologna, Italy, & at Montpellier, Toulouse, & Le Puy-en-Velay in southern France. His preaching also took him to Padua, where he is believed to have founded a Franciscan community. He won great admiration as a preacher & was noted for his simple yet profound teaching of the Catholic faith. He was proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius XII in 1946.

The reason why we pray to him to find our lost things comes from a story that says that St Anthony had a valuable book of psalms that was extremely important to him, he kept notes on it about his sermons & devotions. One day, a novice monk who had chosen to leave had taken the psalter with him. Prior to the invention of the printing press, any book was hand-copied, & thus, an item of high value; a Franciscan friar in particular, given his vow of poverty, would have found such an item difficult to replace. When Anthony realized his psalter was missing, he prayed it would be found or returned, after which the thief was moved to not only return the book to Anthony, but also return to the order. The stolen book is said to be preserved in the Franciscan friary in Bologna

In his later years & the years after his death, Anthony became the centre of a strong devotion. People began looking for his help when they misplaced or lost something of value, & many reported experiencing successes in finding their lost possessions after praying to him.

The image of St Anthony is mainly recognized because next to St Joseph & the Blessed Virgin Mary, St Anthony of Padua is the saint who is most depicted in statues or images holding the Child Jesus.

The tradition honours a mystical experience St. Anthony had during his life that was witnessed by a benefactor who gave the Franciscan saint a place to stay for the night. One version of the story is narrated in The Life of St. Anthony published in 1895.

The mystical vision highlights the child-like simplicity of St. Anthony & the purity of his faith. He is known for his profound sermons & his love & care for the poor. His sanctity was so well-known throughout the Church that he was canonized less than one year after his death.

If you are new to the parish, please collect a registration form from the foyer or the Parish Office and please come and say hello to one of the Clergy or Nancy at mass.





Today's Readings

Entrance Antiphon

The Spirit of the Lord has filled the whole world and that which contains all things understands what is said, alleluia.

First Reading Acts of the Apostles 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Responsorial Psalm Ps 103:1. 24. 29-31. 34. R. v.30 Lord, send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth.

Second Reading Romans 8:8-17

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you. So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live. Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear united witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory.
