Hello Everyone!

With the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord we close what in other times used to be known as the Christmas Season, 40 days after the Nativity of the Lord. I remember growing up, this was the day when all Christmas decorations were taken down as we wait patiently for the next year. The day after the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, the Church celebrates the memory of a very interesting Saint.



St. Blaise, also known as Blasius, was a fourth-century bishop and martyr venerated in the Catholic Church, particularly as the patron of those afflicted with throat ailments, woolcombers, animals, veterinarians, and town criers. His feast day is celebrated on February 3, marked by the traditional blessing of throats using two crossed candles, invoking his intercession. While historical evidence for his life is limited to traditions from the eighth century onward, his legendary acts portray him as a compassionate healer and steadfast confessor of the faith during the persecution of Licinius who reigned from 308 to 324 AD.

According to the accounts in his Acts, Blaise was born to wealthy and noble parents in Sebastea (modern Sivas, in Armenia Minor). He received a Christian education and, while still young, was ordained a bishop of that city. Some traditions describe

him first as a physician, reflecting his later miraculous healings. When the persecution under Emperor Licinius intensified around 316, Blaise, guided by divine inspiration, withdrew to a cave in the surrounding mountains. There, he lived as a hermit, surrounded by wild animals whom he healed of wounds and illnesses. These beasts would approach him peacefully, receiving his blessing, demonstrating his harmony with creation and foreshadowing his patronage of animals.

His seclusion ended when hunters, sent by the governor Agricolaus to capture animals for the amphitheater, discovered him amid the beasts. Amazed by the scene, they arrested him and brought him before the governor. En route, a striking miracle occurred: a poor woman lamented the loss of her pig, stolen by a wolf. At Blaise's command, the wolf returned the pig unharmed, an event that gave rise to devotional practices and underscored his authority over animals. This story, echoed in variations like freeing a wolf from a thorn, highlights his role as protector of livestock and patron of veterinarians.

In Sebastea, Blaise's fame grew through further wonders. A woman brought her dying son, choking on a fishbone lodged in his throat. Blaise healed the boy instantly, establishing his enduring association with throat afflictions. Imprisoned and ordered scourged and starved by Agricolaus, Blaise received secret aid from the woman whose pig was restored; she brought food and tapers to light his dark cell. These candles later inspired the throat-blessing practice.

Refusing to sacrifice to pagan gods, Blaise endured horrific tortures. Licinius commanded his flesh be raked with iron wool-combs—a tool of his future patrons, the woolcombers—before he was beheaded. His steadfastness sealed his martyrdom, probably around 316. A faint historical link appears in the acts of St. Eustratius, suggesting Blaise reverently handled that martyr's relics during Diocletian's time, affirming his early veneration.

Blaise's veneration spread widely, especially from the eighth century. Relics, some allegedly brought West, fueled miracles, propagating his cult in Europe. In Germany, he ranks among the Fourteen Holy Helpers (Nothhelfer). French and German devotion remains strong, with blessings of "St. Blaise's water" for sick cattle. Pope Benedict XVI highlighted him in 2010 alongside other martyrs like St. Agatha. In Rome, the February 3 blessing with candles is still practiced as in some other countries.

Today, Blaise inspires trust in God's providence amid suffering. His life teaches compassion for the vulnerable—human and animal alike—and bold witness to Christ. As one tradition notes, town criers invoke him for clear proclamation, linking throat protection to communicative vocations. Through his intercession, the faithful seek healing and strength, honoring a saint whose legendary gentleness triumphed over persecution.
